Soft Targets / Target Rich Environment

Soft targets are the easiest to attack.

- Foreign Terrorist Organizations
- Religious
- Single Issues (animals, trees, environment)

Learn from previous attacks; previous history; family, work, school history, pre attack behaviors

- Motivations, ideology, triggers.
- How was this planned, who was the target, what weapons were used, what was the trigger?
- Who was the target? Why did the attacker choose that location?

Churches are unique

- Symbolic targets
- Clearly marked
- Open door policy
- Invite in those who are suffering

- Share facility
- Open events
- Routine Service

"Security Fatigue"

- Emotional traps: It will never happen to them, will not happen to them
- People hear about incidents occurring all the time.

Churches have feeling a sense of "protection from above" which increases their vulnerability.

Use a Vulnerability Assessment Tool; 20-point scale, your processes, speak open and talk with each other about concerns.

- Discuss: aware of risk, history of risk, open as a group
- Talk to law enforcement questions, stay updated about local threats, read case studies.
- It does not matter what size of church you are, or size. If someone is trying to target it does not matter.

Security Environment testing; live exercise, press to vulnerability so you know what you need to focus on.

Mass notifications; Crisis response team

Cyber Threat; CC, personal information, school records.

Mail, Bomb Threats have increased, physical bombings have decreased
